The following issues were included as options: 1) the rise of China, 2) the assertiveness of Russia, 3) North Korea, 4) Iran, 5) trade deficit, 6) the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, 7) the war on ISIS, 8) the war on al-Qaeda, 9) the civil war in Libya, 10) the civil war in Yemen, 11) U.S. immigration policy, and 12) the tense relations with Egypt and Saudi Arabia. Differences of means are shown below for the five issues respondents ranked as most important.
