The variable *global priorities* is measured by responses to the following survey question: "On a scale of 1-10, where ten is very important and one is not important, how important are the following issues in American global priorities?" The following issues were included as options: 1) the rise of China, 2) the assertiveness of Russia, 3) North Korea, 4) Iran, 5) trade deficit, 6) the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, 7) the war on ISIS, 8) the war on al-Qaeda, 9) the civil war in Libya, 10) the civil war in Yemen, 11) U.S. immigration policy, and 12) the tense relations with Egypt and Saudi Arabia. Differences of means are shown below for the five issues respondents ranked as most important.
