


Figure 13: KMF/78 Tomb 124. (a) Tomb during excavation, general view of upper levels from the south. (b) Sarcophagus from the south. (c) View of west skull in sarcophagus. (d) View of west wall from the east. Photos: BSA Archive.

The surviving floor is of kouskouras but 3 tiles laid flat in SW corner of SE chamber might indicate a tile floor. It was divided into three chambers of unequal size (W, NE, SE). Pottery found in this tomb consisted of Phocaean, African, Cypriot and local/regional red-slipped ware dishes and bowls, cooking wares, plainwares including basins, flasks, jugs and beehive rings, and a Cretan amphora (Hayes 2001, 439–40). Finds also included a bronze ring, a pale green stone from a ring, a gold earring, two small coins, glass beads, vessel fragments and tesserae, pieces of an iron blade, and iron nails. There was an unusual dearth of sub-adult burials in this tomb, with only two children, and 26 adults.



The sides of the tomb were faced with rectangular cut marble slabs. The interior was stone-lined with fitted blocks of limestone and the floor was three large flat tiles and a marble slab. Tomb construction and body arrangement with arms crossed over the stomach very similar to Tomb 21, over which the church was built, which suggests that these tombs were contemporary (along with the other tombs of 'Area A', assigned to the 3rd-4th centuries).

Tomb 8, the so-called "Bishop's Tomb", was incorporated into the nave of the basilica and would have been one of the first things visible upon entry. It contained two glass vessels. The removal of the head (after decomposition, leaving fragments of sphenoid, maxilla, mandible, the hyoid bone and an ossified thyroid bone) and the bored hole for pouring libations indicate an important occupant for this tomb, speculated to have been a clergyman or martyr.
